## **St. Patrick's Festival Lecture – Monday 9<sup>th</sup> March Down Cathedral – lecture in the Cathedral**

This year's lecture, by Fred Rankin, is once again supported by Down District Council and is free to all members of the public. Fred Rankin is a former president of the Lecale Historical Society and is the leading authority on the history of Down Cathedral. He is author of the book on the history of the Cathedral published by the Ulster Historical Foundation.

Down Cathedral is one of the two oldest ecclesiastical foundations in Ulster still in use. Although the present structure dates from the early thirteenth century it is known that there had been a monastery and place of worship on the Hill of Down for many centuries before then.

This website has a section on "Resources" which permits researchers to search Griffiths Valuation, both by family name and by placename. The researcher can also obtain access to a digitised valuation map. It is possible that some difficulties may be encountered as this site is still under development.

Griffiths Valuation was the first land valuation in Ireland and is an important genealogical resource as it lists every landholder and householder for every county in Ireland in the mid 1800s.

Launched in October 2008, this website is a placenames database of Ireland, created by Fiontar(DCU) and The Placenames Branch (Department of Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs). This resource is still under development and is of use to historians and researchers in genealogy, featuring a system which enables simultaneous Irish-English and English-Irish translation of lists of placenames.

The National Archives of Ireland has established a research partnership with Library and Archives Canada to facilitate digitisation, indexing and contextualisation of the 1901 and 1911 census records. The records for 1911 are being digitised first, followed by those for 1901. The 1911 Census records for Antrim, Down, Dublin and Kerry are now available online. Further details regarding the publication of the other counties are available on the website.

You can search this site either by name of individual, or by location. The less information you enter, the more numerous the results. The names on this site have been transcribed as they were written into the census forms and spellings have not been corrected.
